



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THE View FROM Here

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, and this year I'm feeling the weight of that ritual more than usual. We'll gather and mark each other's foreheads with ashes, saying what we all know but rarely speak out loud: we are dust and to dust we shall return. It's the kind of truth that hollows you out a little. Makes you lighter. Opens up room inside for something else to grow.

We've known so much collective loss lately. Institutions crumbling, civic responsibility abandoned, constitutional rights trampled. Closer to home we've said goodbye to parents and grandparents, friends we thought we'd have longer. Quieter losses too—the kind that don't make headlines but break hearts just the same. We need this season. We need permission to grieve, to rest, to let ourselves be carved out and made new.

It's time for "The Way of the Cross," our Lenten worship series through the second half of John's Gospel. We're going to walk with Jesus through Jerusalem in the days leading up to the cross, and John doesn't pull any punches.

We'll hear Jesus getting that awful call no one wants to hear—his friend Lazarus is dying. We'll watch him show up too late, stand beside Mary and Martha as they demand to know why he wasn't there when they needed him most. We'll see their grief break something loose in Jesus, like a door opening up inside him, and suddenly he'll know what it is to arrive too late, to leave things unsaid, to rage against the unfairness of it all.

That's what this season is about. Not fixing everything or making it all better. Just showing up and letting the grief do its work. Letting it carve out that hollow space where compassion lives, where we learn we're not alone in this.

We'll be gathering in covenant groups and book studies, prayer gatherings and service teams, sharing our lives and listening for God's story unfolding right here among us. We'll come together for worship and peel back the week, let our souls breathe a little. And we'll tackle the questions that matter most: Why do innocent people suffer? How can a loving God permit evil to persist? What does it mean to follow a savior who knows what it is to grieve?

By Easter, I think we'll all be a couple sizes bigger on the inside. That's what happens when you make room for both grief and resurrection.

Lent is a gift. It gives us permission to be human, to be mortal, to know our limits and our pain. And then it reminds us: we belong to God. In our anger, in our doubt, in our fear, in our helplessness, we are beloved children held by a love that will not let us go.

We'll do this together.


My Last Column

You will also have had an opportunity to read our 2025 Annual Report.

I recommend reading or at least reviewing that entire report. From this you will gain an appreciation of the breadth, depth, and talents of this congregation and staff and learn some surprising new things about our church and our activities.

(On a side note, I noticed during my review of the Annual Report that once again my Moderator's Reflection is the longest article. I was reminded of the 2012 Annual Report, my last report as church Treasurer, where I took some good-natured ribbing during the Annual Meeting because my Treasurer's Report ran to six pages that year (Yes, it was too long)).

At the risk of repeating myself, I would like to tell you what a pleasure it was to work with Immediate Past Moderator Sonia Jordan and Moderator-Elect (and now Moderator) Jenny O'Brien. The job of Moderator is not a one-person job. We often refer to these three positions as "the Moderator Team". That term is a practical reflection of the teamwork required to do this work.



I would also like to repeat my appreciation for the members of the Project Management Committee. Their work of balancing competing interests and grappling with a complex renovation/construction/new organ project can not be understated. Please see my column in the Annual Report for a complete list of members who continue to serve on this committee.

Our Church Council serves as the governing body of our church. These members meet monthly and collectively make both routine and strategic or complex decisions on our behalf. You can find a complete roster of the 10 voting Council members on the nominating ballot in the Annual Report. Get to know who they are. Engage them in conversation before church or during coffee hour (hint: look for red name tags!) and please join me in expressing our appreciation for the time and energy they devote to our church!


Operationally Speaking...

I'm so glad life has led me back to Plymouth. I started attending in 2013, right after I moved to Lawrence to start my PhD in Communication Studies at KU. I joined the church staff as Membership Associate in 2018; my tenure happened across two pastoral transitions and the pandemic. Eventually, my job morphed into Welcome & Care Coordinator. A few accomplishments about which I am still proud: I facilitated the church's transition to a new membership database, moderated online fellowship groups during Covid, worked with the Membership board to create systems for welcoming visitors and new members (including the Welcome Table and Discover Plymouth), and helped rewrite the bylaws. Essentially, I fell in love with church work—the minutia and the overall mission.

I finished my degree and in 2022, my family moved to Ohio. We had our daughter Gideon and moved to North Carolina. When Gideon was really little, I did a small amount of litigation consulting and all but full-time mommy-ing. I cherish that intense time together; Gideon started preschool in September and I'm excited for what comes next.

When I was offered the position of Plymouth's Operations Director, I knew God was calling me back to the church. This position is fairly new; Jaron Asher worked with church leaders to split the old Business Administrator job in half. As Director of Operations, my purview is



long-term strategic planning and supervision of the Admin Team, including our Administrative Assistant, Ann Lounsbury; our Accountant, Melissa Praderio; our Facilities Manager, Matt Del Vecchio, and our Business Manager, Brittani Anderson. Brittani provides the counterpoint to my job, managing the week-to-week business needs of the church so that I can focus on the big picture. Basically, I'm working on all the important but non-pressing projects that get moved to the back burner when you have to keep a big church functioning.

I am working with the staff and lay leaders to identify crucial long-term projects and setting goals to make sure they happen. My hope is to develop some needed systems, document the ones we have in place, and strategize to cut operating expenses so that we can have more resources to grow our church and better live out our mission. Plymouth is a thriving church community and I am so grateful to be back, for the worship of God and the service of all.


If you are newer to the Justice Matters community, we will have a breakout session to answer questions and connect with you.

Project Management Committee Update



Twelve dedicated Plymouth folks have amassed a phenomenal amount of time, commitment, and passion to assist Plymouth Church in an upgraded sanctuary space – while at all times remembering the past and respecting it for any future changes. *Where are we with the project?*

In recent days and weeks, your **Project Management Committee** has submitted design recommendations to the Church Council for acceptance. The renovation project is really four identifiable important parts – three are easy to see in the rendering while the fourth needs more explanation. The most important part of the sanctuary renovation is preparing for the newly purchased pipe organ. As you remember, the pipe organ construction will not begin until 2027 and will not be completely installed until January, 2028. This is a two-million-dollar project that requires months of design, disassembling Plymouth's current organ (some of the parts will be used in the new organ), and constructing case work to contain the hundreds of new, moving parts required.

The reconstruction of the choir loft area will

allow a lower placement for choir members with an accessible lift hidden behind part of the new casework. The new loft will accommodate 30+ choir members and place the director in a similar place but much lower where all performers can see the director and the director can see them. The most striking part of the new choir loft and organ casework is the commitment made to use all the historical wood and when needed, construct new pieces to look exactly like the old. The new organ pipes are proposed to have some color with limited meaningful etching. Plymouth Congregants got to hear (and see!) from the designer himself on Sunday, January 25 as he presented interactively from Wyomissing, Pennsylvania.

The third most obvious renovation will be the new design of the worship chancel. This space will be elevated across the front of the sanctuary with an accessible ramp on the south side. Those who have participated in worship from the floor include the pianist, the bell choirs, string ensembles, instrumentalists from the Gathering of Grace service, and ensemble performers. The new chancel will have all worship participants on the same




level. Accessibility and flexibility with the chancel space were deemed high priorities by the Enter In Campaign when they started raising support and funding. Plymouth Congregants will weigh in for this part of the renovation with a **called congregation meeting on Sunday, February 22.**

The other changes and improvements that will happen with this project are not seen in the renderings. Notably, there will be all new wood flooring installed. There will be a hearing loop installed for greater accessibility. There will be improvements made to the air handling systems. The sanctuary sound system will be new with multitudes of sound enhancing measures taken. Lighting of the sanctuary will be improved. And finally, all the walls and the ceiling of the historical structure will receive new paint.

As the time nears, the **Project Management Committee** will announce a closing date for the sanctuary in order for demolition and salvageable pieces of the current pipe organ to occur. Six months of construction related work will be needed to reopen the sanctuary

to worship. A special thank you is extended to Moderator Elect Jenny O'Brien and her committee for the work to plan and implement an alternative worship experience in the Mayflower Room after construction begins.



Soup, Learn, Share




The History of Change at Plymouth Church

Called Congregational Meeting February 22, 2026

A called congregational meeting of Plymouth Congregational Church will be held **February 22, 2026 in the sanctuary at the conclusion of the 9:30 worship service.**

The purpose of the meeting will be to "discuss and vote upon the proposed modifications to the chancel" as requested in a petition received by the Moderator and signed by 5% of the members of the congregation.

Flower Donations



With a new year, we have a new set of Sundays available for flower donations. The flowers you give beautify the sanctuary and enhance our worship experience. Your donations do double duty. On Monday, Plymouth's Flower Ministry divides these arrangements into smaller bouquets, which they deliver to members who are ill, experiencing a loss in the family, or unable to come to church in person.

Forms for donations, plus the calendar for 2026, are on the wall just outside the church office. As with everything else, the cost of flowers has increased in recent years. At its December meeting, the Deacons Board voted to increase the default amount of an arrangement from \$67 to \$100. It has been many years since that amount was raised.

As we enter a new year of service in our community, we want to highlight one of our mission partners:

Somos Plymouth Language Program.

In 2025, administration of the program transitioned to a new organization, Somos Lawrence. In recognition of this change, the program is now called Somos Plymouth Language Program (SPLP).

About Somos Lawrence

Somos Lawrence is a Ballard Center partner that assists non-English speaking residents, particularly Spanish speakers, by breaking down language, cultural and financial barriers.

Somos Lawrence provides a range of support to individuals and families, including language interpretation, assistance with school enrollment, and help navigating taxes, housing and medical care. In addition, they host cultural and community events throughout the year.

Get Involved

Somos Plymouth Language Program is one of our valued mission partners. Other mission partners include Family Promise, Head Start, Just Food, Justice Matters, Kansas Interfaith Action (KIFA) and LINK.

The language program relies on volunteers, including conversation partners who work with level 1 and level 2 ESL students in small groups, or in our general conversation class. In addition, we have volunteer roles for door greeters and childcare assistance. While most of our ESL students are native Spanish speakers, it is not necessary to speak Spanish in order to volunteer.

You can express interest in becoming a volunteer on the Somos Plymouth website at any time.

Building Community

Whether you are involved with the language program or one of our other mission partners, you are helping us build stronger ties within our congregation, and just as importantly, touching the lives of people in our city who need the support of a caring community.






Spiritual Book Club




Centering Prayer

Expect contemplative silence, some video and in-person teaching, and companionship as we learn to pray together. No previous experience or study necessary.









Gabriel Fauré



Gabriel Fauré finished composing Requiem in 1888. This 'first version' consisted of five movements and was accompanied by strings, harp, timpani, and organ. An expanded version included two additional movements, the "Offertoire" and the "Libera me." The noted American choral conductor Dennis Keene observed, Requiem "depicts the timelessness of human existence, the procession of generations, human longings, profound sorrow, fear of the unknown, as well as light, hope, the ultimate joys of heaven, and, above all, peace."

Fauré commented about the work,
"Everything I managed to entertain by way of religious illusion I put into my Requiem, which moreover is dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest."



Celebrating Plymouth's 50 Plus Year Members

Like many members of Plymouth Church, Jim Whitenight enjoys the sermons. He said, "Hearing the good sermons that I'm hearing now from our ministers is really wonderful."

Jim also enjoys another aspect of belonging. "Part of it is being in the choir. I've been in the choir since around 1974." Singing in the choir creates an opportunity to develop friendships.

Steve Bradt also sings in the choir. "I have valued the time I've gotten to spend in choir with Jim - for close to 46 years - more than I can imagine," said Steve. "Jim is one of the kindest and most generous people I know. His enthusiasm is contagious. The choir has been tremendously important to Jim. It's a big part of who he is."

Jim, who was born to Ken and Ethel (Hack) Whitenight in 1947, moved to Lawrence with his family in 1950. "We're all brothers in our family. I'm the youngest, and there were Pete, Chris, and Ken."

"It's just Pete and me and Ken that are alive. Pete lives outside of town in Mom and Dad's old house." Ken lives in Austin, Texas, and Chris died of cancer in 1992.


The Whitenights joined Plymouth in 1961, when Jim was in junior high. "We joined the church here. We used to go over to the Methodist Church years earlier, but my folks decided they liked it here better, so we moved."

"I was involved in youth activities. We had a youth fellowship on Sunday nights at Plymouth when I was in junior high and through high school.

Jim's mom, Ethel, was a sister of Al Hack. The children in the two families grew up together. "We spent a lot of time as kids playing together. On Thanksgiving and Christmas, we got together, and we opened presents early Christmas morning, and things like that."

Jim attended Cordley Elementary School, Central Junior High, and Lawrence High. "I graduated from there in '65."

A friend introduced Jim to Janet Rider several years later, and they married on July 24, 1971. "Her name became Whitenight when we got married. We were married, right, about 53 years." Janet died in December of 2024.



"We had two children, Jennifer and Jeff. Jennifer lives with me. She moved in before Janet passed away, to help out. She's still living there, and we help each other out a lot."

Jeff, who has two adult children, Cameron and Addison, works at Crown Toyota. "They come over on Sunday, and we watch the games on TV, sports things, and stuff like that."

"You know, I went through junior high, high school, and I graduated from high school in 65. Soon after graduation, I started working. And that's pretty much what I did until I retired."

Jim started working part-time at his dad's store, The Town Shop on 839 Mass, after school while he was in high school. "I'd go and do clean-up work and run errands for the business," he said.

Eventually, Jim took a job at one of the largest employers in Lawrence. "I worked at the Kmart Distribution Center for about 30 years," he said. "I had to be at work by 7:15. For the most part, I enjoyed my work. I left when I retired in 2013."

Jim is now one of the volunteers who helps to clean the church. "That was shortly after I retired in 2013."

Watching Chiefs football games and KU basketball is something Jim enjoys.

He also likes nature. Jim has been feeding birds for years. "I just put out food for them during the winter. I like the Cardinals, the Blue Jays, and some other pretty birds. I've seen Northern Flickers around. They have spots on their stomach and a black stripe down the front.

Fishing is another hobby. "I like to go fishing in the spring and summer when the weather's nice. Clinton Lake and Lone Star are mostly where I go," said Jim. "I caught a catfish a long time ago, when I was fishing with a friend. And it was, I think, 13 pounds or so. They can get pretty big."
